## Jonah 1 – a man with a mission?



Question: Have you ever been told to do something you

really didn't want to do?

• How did you feel?

• How did you act?

God told Jonah to go to Nineveh, the capital of Assyria and he really did not want to go. God wanted him to prophesy to the people there and tell them that he planned to destroy the city because of their wicked ways. Jonah may have been scared to go there but he had other reasons to rebel too. He knew that if he prophesied as God said, the people of Nineveh may repent and then God would forgive them. And Jonah felt they should be punished. He had been given a clear mission but did not want to go so he ran away.

Questions

Why do you think that:
God chose Jonah to go to Nineveh?

God wanted to warn the people of Nineveh?

Do *you* think we should offer help to people who we think don't deserve it? Why? or why not?

Can you think of some examples?

In Genesis, Adam and Eve tried to hide from God too – Christian faith is clear that, however hard people try, no one is really able to hide from him. Read Psalm 139 to learn more about the impossibility of hiding from God.

# Jonah 4 – only human



The book of Jonah shows that God wants to forgive people - wants them to say sorry and make changes to their behaviour. This makes Jonah angry; he cannot understand why God would choose to forgive the people of Nineveh and he shares his frustration with God who shows Jonah that he has no right to be angry.

The parable in Luke 15:11 -32 (sometimes called 'The Prodigal Son') gives another example of someone who is angry about compassion being shown when someone else repents. How does the older brother's behaviour mirror Jonah's behaviour?

Can you be happy for others who receive good things? .... Even if you think they may not deserve them?

- Is there anything you find hard to forgive?
- Does the story of Jonah have anything to teach us about finding it hard to forgive?
- Do you think that the story of Jonah is about a historical person or is it a parable—a story to help readers reflect on their own lives and on God?
