

As former President of the Confederation of British Industry and Chancellor of the University of Birmingham, I've always been keen to highlight the importance of high-quality Religious Education in schools.

Over the last decade the subject has evolved to provide a much-needed place in the classroom for young people to engage with the complexity of modern belief, avoid misconceptions, and leave school ready to work with people around the world from all walks of life.

Yet I am concerned with the standard of Religious Education in many schools across the country. RE teachers are some of the most passionate in the country, but a lack of funding and proper support for the subject has led the outgoing Chief Inspector of Education to describe teaching of the subject as 'generally of a poor quality'.

This is why I'm launching a <u>Call to Action</u> for employers and business leaders, a chance for them to stand by students who have expressed an interest in a high quality education in religion and worldviews as preparation for the future workplace.

INTER-FAITH NETWORK

The Inter-Faith Network (IFN), which for many years has spearheaded much of the interfaith work that has been carried on in this country. Inter-Faith week which runs annually in mid-November has been one of the most visible initiatives. Sadly, the government has now withdrawn funding and the IFN will be formally closed at the end of April. Some local interfaith groups may continue to function if they had become independently or self-funded. Look out for local initiatives in the autumn term round Inter-faith week.

REPORTS FROM SPRING TERM RE NETWORKS

SALVATION - A GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE



The January RE network was privileged to hear from Sharon Masters, (Mortimer Schools) and Marion Standing (ODBE Adviser) on their recent trip to India.

They shared some of the photographs of churches in India, enabling delegates



to see the fusion of Christianity with Indian tradition. The crosses by the altar in one church were festooned with the same kind of garlands that frequently adorn

the Murtis in a Hindu Mandir, and in some men and women sit on separate sides of the aisle, often without chairs.

Other aspects of practice, such as communion and baptism were familiar, and other churches had pews, marking a clear path to the colonial past of the tradition. In those churches that had stained glass windows for example, nativity and Easter scenes contain western looking characters in traditional western clothing.

This introduction to Global Christianity made a perfect introduction to considering the way that we might make teaching about Easter and the concept of salvation more diverse. Delegates considered whether the traditional images of Easter such as rabbits and hot cross buns were the same everywhere, but also thought about how we might move beyond tokenistic references to the way Easter is celebrated elsewhere.

In the UK, Easter coincides with the beginning of spring and becomes for many a celebration of new life. Would that be the same in the southern hemisphere where Easter marks the start of autumn? How might that change how people think about the resurrection? This leads into considering the differences between the religious and the cultural expressions of Easter. It is very easy to focus on the different customs, particularly around food and not to look for deeper issues.

The core concepts of Easter such as Salvation, redemption, atonement, reconciliation, satisfaction, oblation, forgiveness, mercy and grace are open to varieties of interpretations. For countries where slavery or racial inequality is the historical background, many of these terms are imbued with greater significance. Liberation Theology, which has its origins in South America, sees the purpose of God's interventions in history as being more about bringing in a reign of justice than demonstrating power. So in many of these communities Easter and salvation are not about getting ready for Heaven and Eternal Life, but about making a difference now, here on earth.

ASSESSMENT AND PROGRESS IN RE

This session started by considering the criticism levelled at much RE teaching by Ofsted:

- Pupils are rarely taught enough substance to prepare them to engage in a complex, multi-religious and multi-secular society (where religion and non-religion play different parts in different people's lives)
- Too often, schools do not teach topics in the RE curriculum deeply enough for pupils to develop a substantial understanding of the subject matter

In the rest of the session, we began to consider how we might assess our school's curriculum against these criteria, considering whether pupils make progress against the stated outcomes. We established that the reasons for assessing are really the following:

- To check that the curriculum is working.
- To check that teaching and learning are effective.
- To see if pupils are flourishing.

So therefore, assessment needs to link to the curriculum, assess what pupils are ACTUALLY learning and be specific. Generically created grids are not going to achieve this adequately and are often far too vague to inform teachers about either progress or attainment.

There are some key questions that teachers need to ask:

- Do pupils know what they should know and are they confident in understanding that knowledge?
- Have pupils developed their disciplinary knowledge?
- What skills have pupils acquired?

- How have pupils developed their understanding of ways of believing and sources of authority?
- How have they developed their understanding of the ways of living and the things that shape these?
- How have they developed their understanding of different ways of reasoning about God, humans and the world?

Small groups explored some of the ways that teachers might find out what pupils know and can do at the end of a unit. Being clear about the core knowledge to be learned and about the way that pupils will show that learning are essential to being about to plan for assessment. The new Diocesan Scheme of Work (2023), like Understanding Christianity, has building blocks and outcomes. These should be used at the planning stage and the suggested activities in both schemes selected to enable the pupils to learn the content.

We have begun to talk about how we might assess disciplinary knowledge ... but more of that on 18 April. Book you place to find out more.
